Melinda Moore, PhD

Dr. Moore is an Assistant Professor in the Department of Psychology at Eastern Kentucky University and part of the core clinical faculty in the Clinical Psychology doctoral program. She is the principal investigator of the EKU SAFE grant and conducts suicide bereavement, posttraumatic growth, and other suicide related research at EKU. She teaches "Psy 863 Understanding Suicide: From Assessment to Intervention and Management" to graduate students and supervises doctoral students in the suicide focused treatment, Collaborative Assessment and Management of Suicidality (CAMS), in the EKU Psychology Clinic. Dr. Moore runs the bi-weekly EKU Survivors of Suicide (SOS) group at the EKU Burnam House, as well as being in private practice in Lexington, Kentucky. Dr. Moore is the Clinical Division Director of the American Association of Suicidology and recently published The Suicide Funeral (or Memorial Service): Honoring their Memory, Comforting their Survivors with her co-editor Rabbi Daniel Roberts. He earned a Fellow in Thanatology Certification awarded by the Association for Death Education and Counseling and is its immediate past treasurer. Throughout his career Rabbi Roberts has been intrigued with the field of Thanatology. As a suicide prevention leader in Ohio, he produced the documentary *Inside I Ache*, geared toward adolescents wrestling with suicidal thoughts and feelings. He is the author of Clergy Retirement: Every Ending is a New Beginning and his most recent, The Suicide Funeral (or Memorial Service): Honoring their Memory, Comforting their Survivors, was published in May 2017 with co-editor Melinda Moore.
